Lettalou Whittington (1927-2017)



Lettalou Whittington was a huge supporter of Houston Audubon for 27 years and a Lifetime Member. For 22 of those years, she was on the Houston Audubon Board of Directors for 9 years (1995-2004) and Board of Advisors for 13 years (2004-2017). She was a significant donor for many years to various projects. In 2000, she asked her friend Ann Weir Jones to contribute to her Birdathon team. Just so happened, Ann was waiting to contribute to a project that really spoke to her. That was the year Ann made the lead gift to the Bolivar Flats Shorebird Expansion Campaign. It was Lettalou who sparked this extremely generous donation. And after that amazing request, the Birdathon Award for Most Money Raised was named the Whittington Award. Even today, the Whittington Award is one of the most coveted awards for all Birdathon participants. In 2004, Lettalou made the lead donation to the Winnie Burkett Intern Fund. This fund helped pay the salary for coastal sanctuary interns. The work that Lettalou Whittington did for Houston Audubon over the years is too numerous to mention. She made a huge impact on the organization. It's amazing what one person's efforts can accomplish.
